And the band is playing April 22 in one of Warner's favorite spots, the Paramount Theatre.

"Shows like the Paramount are just awesome," said Warner, who lives in rural Clearwater. "We do a few of those a year, and I'd love do more of those a year. ... When you get the bigger rooms, it just opens up the possibilities. It's a whole different feel of what's going on."

One of the songs that the Youth Chorale of Central Minnesota will do is "Have a Little Faith." When Warner recorded it, he had JD Steele, who recorded with artists such as Prince, supply the background music.

"He just cut all these different parts, 19. 20 different vocal tracks, and made this whole choir of sound behind me," Warner said. "That's what the choir's going to be doing. We need a whole choir to replace JD."
